


Naka and Nala talk about the earth




Naka and Nala are working in the garden. They are planting vegetables.

"Why are we working so hard in the sun?" puffs Nala.




"We are working hard because we love the earth!" exclaims Naka

"If we look after the earth, the earth will look after us," he adds.




"We plant vegetables so that we can eat healthy food," says Naka.

Naka says, "Let's sit, and I'll tell you about our earth."




Naka begins, "The earth is the round planet on which we live.

"The force of gravity holds us here. This force pulls us towards the planet," answers Naka.




"How can we take care of the earth?" asks Nala.
