

























"You are in the World of Smoke now. We come out whenever you burn fires on earth. This world is created by people like you," the Leader said.




"That's terrible! This can cause great disasters in the world. You must stop this immediately," Bodhini pleaded.


"We are only being ourselves. If people want to be safe from us, they must stop creating smoke! They must stop our sources," the Leader advised.

When Bodhini opened her eyes, she was in a hospital. "Was I dreaming?" She wondered.




